Dean's Message

I want to welcome you all back from the holiday break! I hope that each of you had a wonderful break and enjoyed special time with your family and friends. Time away from our everyday tasks can be very restorative, with renewed enthusiasm and vigor.

As you begin the new year, I hope you take time to reflect on who and what is important to you. Being the Dean of the College for Health and Human Services remains an honor and privilege, and I appreciate all of your contributions that allow us to thrive, grow, and advance into the future. This past year was very eventful. I wanted to share some of the achievements.

- ✓ We have received over \$3M between 3 different grants this year, much of which goes directly to students for their education.
- ✓ We have increased our collaborative outreach initiatives with adding more health systems to our list of tuition scholarship partnerships. In addition to MyMichigan, Covenant, McClaren, and Memorial Health, we added Schuerer Health, Sparrow Health System, Mary Free Bed, Great Lakes Health Centers, and HealthSource. We are currently working on 8 more to include the VA, Sanilac County Community Mental Health, UP Health (Bell, Marquette, Portage), Munson Health, Schoolcraft, and Henry Ford Health Systems.
- ✓ Received the credentialing from the Michigan Department of Education for the MSW School Social Worker credential.
- ✓ Our part-time nursing program has enrolled its first class which is going very well.
- ✓ Reaffirmation of Master's in Social Work program and the Nursing Simulation Center.
- ✓ Approval of SVSU's first 4+1 program with BS/MS in Public Health
- ✓ New minor in Behavioral Health-Substance Use and Dependency
- ✓ New dual degree program (DNP/PMHNP programs)
- ✓ New graduate certificates in epidemiology, healthcare compliance, healthcare quality and safety.
- ✓ The MSOT program has begun its transition to dual entry.
- ✓ Announce that we received funding to purchase an <u>Anatomage Table</u> for anatomy housed in Kinesiology, but used by all of HHS. Hope to see this delivered in early 2025.

As we move into the new year, there will be many upcoming events and activities to look forward to.

- ✓ Our nursing department's reaccreditation site visit is scheduled for Feb 24-26, 2025.
- ✓ Establishment of the Malcom Field Biomedical Sciences Research Institute (MFBSRI) within Bachand Hall. The Vivarium will be repurposed and renovated to a fully functional interdisciplinary biomedical sciences research facility. This will be completed with the generous support of Dr. Malcolm Field.
- ✓ Further advancements of the Medical Diamond Project. SVSU is fully committed to the establishment of an SVSU Graduate Health Sciences Building within the Medical Diamond in downtown Saginaw. The building will be 48,000 square feet/4 floors. In addition, Great Lakes Bay Health Centers has agreed to add square feet for a fully functional occupational therapy clinic run by SVSU, and several treatment rooms for our social work students and PMHNP students to train. More to come as this project evolves.

In addition to all of that, I recognize the fundamental importance of maintaining a healthy balance for our faculty, staff, and students. We will continue to advance our institutional wellness and DIEBA initiatives into 2025. Remember we are only ½ way through our Wellness Challenge.

We will also be welcoming a new Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs. Dr. Lisa Boehm will begin January 2, 2025. I will be working with her to schedule times to meet with the various departments. I look forward what 2025 will bring our college, and the university.

Through the Substance Use Disorders ECHO, SVSU connects subject-matter experts with professionals across Michigan, enhancing care quality and expanding essential knowledge in substance use treatment and management.

Additionally, SVSU's Project ECHO offers **free continuing education credits** for a variety of professionals, supporting their lifelong learning and career development. Tailored to meet specific needs, these credits are available for the following fields:

- Substance Use Credits: Provided by Mid-State Health Network, meeting DEA training requirements for substance use disorder education
- Social Work Credits: (pending) Provided by Saginaw Valley State University
- Medical Continuing Education Credits: Offered through MyMichigan Health Systems
- Community Health Worker Credits: Provided through Michigan Community Health Worker Alliance
- Educator Continuing Education Credits: Offered by Marquette-Alger Regional Educational Service Agency (MARESA)














Holiday Door Decorating Contest
